

Get the Most Out of Your Committee Membership

1. Make us your favorite.

Add your Committee's(s') page from the ACC website to your internet favorites so you can easily stay informed on what the committee is doing and ACC's committee-related resources and programs. <http://www.acc.com/committees>

2. Don't forget to call.

Set-up recurring meeting notice on your calendar for the scheduled time to participate in the Committee's monthly business meeting which is a toll-free call with a passcode. The agenda for each meeting is available on the ACC website and distributed via the Committee's eGroup.

3. Tell us what you think.

Help determine the Committee's programs and goals by completing the committee survey, if requested. The surveys are easy and only take only a few minutes.

4. eGroups are your friend.

Join the [ACC Committee's eGroup](#) and receive and share information about upcoming meeting events, outside counsel with energy expertise, new regulations and legislation, practice tips, and other information that may be useful to ACC Committee members.

5. Learn or share your knowledge through a Webcast.

Volunteer to serve as a moderator or panelist on a [webcast](#). Better yet, if you have an issue you want to hear about, suggest it to the Committee Chair, or, if you want be more involved, be a panelist for a webcast!

6. Get involved!

Volunteer to help organize or participate as a panelist or moderator in the Committee's [Annual Meeting](#) programs. Participants often receive a waiver of the Annual Meeting registration fees.

7. Share your resources.

8. Meet your fellow committee members at Annual Meeting.
